

- Called "Johnathon Loomis" in the family Bible.^{5912, p 1}

 \bullet The son later took the name of Hay when the maiden name of Hay was restored to the mother. Hence, the name Johnathan Hay. 5911

• Soon after [his mother returned to her parents' farm in Seville], Jonathan left Seville with his aunt Eunice A. Hay, second child of Jonathan and Ruth Hay, born April 4, 1812, and Uncle Ault and went to Oneco, Illinois, where Jonathan remained until 1873, when he absconded, leaving Elizabeth to raise three-year-old Walter by herself.^{6283, p 3, footnote 9}

• Private secretary to General Ulysses S. Grant^{8, p G26}

[Note: after perusing various biographies of Grant, this statement has not been corroborated. Perhaps the family confused this Jonathan Hay with John Milton HAY, who was President Lincoln's private secretary during the Civil War, and afterwards served the country admirably as a statesman, and was Secretary of State under Presidents McKinley and Theodore Roosevelt.]

• When (Civil) war broke out, Lib's husband Jonathan, who taught school, went as General Grant's private secretary.^{6, p 2, line 48}

• I was going through some family correspondence from the Civil War and a letter to

my 2nd great grandmother regarding the death of her son was written and signed by Jonathan Hayes [sic]. It is on stationery from the Provost Marshall's office, Vicksburg, Miss, and dated Sept. 6th 1864. Would you like a copy of it? Barbara Campbell, California⁷³⁸²

• A WHOLESALE FORGER

How Jonathan Hay Flourished at Freeport, His Sudden Departure, and the Developments that Have Followed.

From the Freeport (Ill.) Bulletin, Oct. 2

For about five years Jonathan Hay was a leading, and, we might say, one of the largest, dealers in musical instruments and sewing machines in the West, with his headquarters at Freeport.

He purchased directly from the manufacturers, and established agencies all over this part of the State, and in many localities in the States of Wisconsin and Iowa, and soon, with his army of sub-agents, did an immense business, sales amounting in one month, about one year ago, to \$10,000, as he reported. He had now become a first-class dealer, and one of the largest and, apparently, most responsible in the West. Manufacturers of different instruments wrote him and entreatingly requested that he take their ware, and he should have the most favorable terms. They were desirous that the sale of instruments should be pushed with energy and ability; and for the two years just past he enjoyed an immense trade, his sales being unprecedented. Jonathan Hay was fast becoming, a millionaire, everybody ready to sell goods, his obligations honored at sight, and greenbacks in his hands were apparently a bagatelle.

On Monday, the 15th of last month, he informed Mr. Aaron Wolfe and others that he was going to Iowa to settle with some of his agents there and make some collections; so at noon he leisurely walked down to the Western Union Railroad and took the 1 o'clock train for Savanna, and from there to Iowa. Nothing was heard from him until Wednesday the 24th ult., when a daughter of his, who had been in Chicago taking music lessons, came home and informed Mrs. Hay that she had received a letter from her father, saying that he was never coming back, and requesting her to go to Freeport and convey the sad intelligence to her mother. After Mrs. H. received the news she at once proceeded to sell the goods in the store, which she did in a few hours, selling them at any price, and principally at less than half wholesale rates. She then informed their creditors and the banks and capitalists in the city. The Hay

bubble exploded, and, upon investigation, it was discovered that a large share of those notes were forgeries, or, at least, so claimed by the parties represented. In said list the forged notes are marked, and, so far as parties have been seen, their statements have agreed with the explanatory statements in the book, over Mr. Hay's own signature. Why that book was delivered by Mrs. Hay, is a mystery. The amount of his forgeries in dollars and cents is not so large for the amount of notes forged. The number of notes may reach 150, amounting to about \$25,000. Many of these notes are gorged against citizens residing within a few miles of Freeport; and some of them were sold or pledged by Mr. Hay, fourteen months ago, to our bankers and shrewd capitalists.

Jonathan is a fugitive from justice. For three years he studiously endeavored to earn a reputation for honesty, fair dealing, and promptness in meeting all his obligations. He succeeded by a series of forgeries that, for boldness and number, are without a precedent, either in ancient or modern times. His forgeries extend through a period of over three years. The number of notes forged during that time will approximate 500, and generally against good and prominent men of this and adjacent counties. Notes were forged and pledged for money, and, as they matured, were redeemed by new forgeries.

Whither Mr Hay has gone is, of course, only a conjecture. The companion of his bosom amy know; but she is reticent upon the subject. She is busily engaged in securing from the wreck all the property she can. That Jonathan had accomplices, no one will doubt. Who they are, time alone will reveal.

We regard it imprudent, at this time, to give the names of the forged notes, but will do so at the proper time. We might state here the amount of papers held by different persons here in this city; Mr. Wolfe, about \$14,000; Messrs. Knowlton & Sons, about \$3,000; First National Bank, \$1,000; Dr. S. J. Best, about \$800; and H. B. Amerling, about \$3,000. the above are only a portion of the notes pledged by him. Manufacturers of pianos, organs, and sewing-machines also held large amounts as collateral. His liabilities will approximate \$50,000.⁵⁹⁸⁸

• Hay was a smooth, gentlemanly-appearing man, of very insinuating address, and reputed to be quite wealthy. Part of his business was in selling pianos and machines, and to take notes in partial payment. Affairs went on swimmingly until about the 5th of September, when Ada, his daughter, received a letter saying that she would never see him again. This was a thunderbolt.⁵⁹⁹⁰

• [excerpts]

Jonathan Hay had been, it seems from the evidence, engaged since 1871 in Freeport as dealer in musical instruments and sewing-machines. In the fall of 1873 he absconded, in consequence of forgeries which it is alleged he had committed.⁵⁹⁹¹

• ...that she had supported not only herself and children, but her husband also, her husband having shown no remarkable ability in any direction except in the way of contracting debts. Mrs. **Hay** had also been for several years the owner of the homestead occupied by her family, and the title stood in her name. In the beginning of the year 1869 Jonathan **Hay** was indebted in large amounts, and all of Mrs. **Hay's** private property, acquired by her individual skill and labor, was sold to satisfy the claims of her husband's creditors, as prior to the year 1869 the earnings of the wife belonged absolutely to the husband.^{5974, p 3}

• Not present with family in 1880 Census.¹⁷⁰³

• I spoke with my mother tonight about Jonathan Hay. She says she has an original letter written by Elizabeth O'Brien written to Walter Hay (she thinks) explaining what Jonathan was doing in the Civil War, and why there was the big gap of years between Lillian, Ada and Walter. My mother is blind now, so asking her to look for something is like asking Helen Keller for help. In any event, she says that in the letter Elizabeth explains how her husband went off to war and served as a "physician" – or perhaps tended the wounded and was gone for quite a number of years; mom recalls something about the "siege of Corinth" and that he fought in Mississippi, and the Gulf of Mobile, and even Louisiana. (She recalled helping my brother do some school history project – like 48 years ago – and they plotted out the route with tacks and string. Her memory is amazing.) She has the recollection that the army unit was the Illinois 11th. She remembers the alliteration.⁵⁹¹⁴

• Where the devil did Jonathan get to? Where is he buried? He is not buried at Mound Hill at Seville, Ohio. I checked the Veterans national cemeteries and found nothing. At the time he "absconded," I believe that a bankrupt might not have his debts forgiven. Certainly at that time if you were bankrupt in one state and you left, and you had debts owed from another state, you were subject to arrest in the second state.

By the way, I also found that a teacher made around \$22 a month in Illinois in the

early 1860s. You could do better as a washerwoman!^{5974, p 1}

- "...and has never been heard of or from by applicant since September 15, 1873. She believes him dead." $^{5976,\,p\,2}$

 \bullet That the said Jonathan was a pensioner at Chicago Agency under Certificate #83447." $^{5976,\,p\,2}$

• State Fair Speeders (yearling trotters): Jonathan Hay, St. Paul; emerson, blk. c.⁶⁰¹⁹ (Note; unproven, but possible, this is the same Jonathan Hay)

• Jonathan Hay did other things: he was a Deputy County Surveyor with the county in 1859, per a deed I found. He was a clerk for the Winnisheik Insurance Co., per the Freeport City Directory, for several years, 1867-69, a company owned by U.S. Grant and others that ultimately failed. This may be where the intelligence of "Jonathan worked as Grant's secretary" came from.⁶¹⁵⁰

• "Him" seems to be code for Elizabeth's husband, Jonathan Hay, who absconded September 15, 1873, from Freeport, Illinois, and was thought to be dead, according to Elizabeth's Civil War Widow's Pension application, dated August 19, 1890. Since Jonathan Hay was likely a fugitive, mother and son could not address him by name. Jonathan Hay was, in 1873, a dealer in Singer Sewing Machines, Steinway pianos, organs, and other musical merchandise, with a business located on Exchange Street, opposite French's Hotel, in Freeport, Illinois. He had a selling radius of thirty miles from Freeport, per his business card of 1873. He sold his wares "on time," and sold the notes, many of them forged instruments, at discount, to unwary investors. When he absconded, newspapers variously reported the forgeries at between \$24,000 and \$70,000.^{6283, p 2 footnote}

• "I am glad he solaced himself by marrying,..."

Jonathan and Elizabeth never divorced, so it appears Jonathan was a bigamist. $^{\rm 6283,\,p}_{\rm 2}$

• he meant to be honest—but he was a <u>Plunger</u> never looking ahead farther than one day. He was an honest man but a bad financier. I often begged him to do nothing—and I would support him. Too late to recriminate now: I don't think he can live long. His Grandfather & Grandmother on his fathers side died two days apart – with dropsy. • I am thinking that Jonathan must have gone "in" 3 times: once with the 11th Regiment, once with the 46th regiment, both times as a volunteer; then into the Union Regular Army, up to his armpits in gore and gangrene. Somehow he must have come to the attention of Grant.^{5920, p 3}

• I was looking at the book on baptisms for the St. Mary's church in Underhill, Vermont, and I noticed that my gggrandfather, Patrick Giblin, was the godfather to Elizabeth O'Brien. Her baptism date (might be birth date) is recorded as 3 Oct 1832. The Godmother was recorded as Mary McGrath. Patrick Giblin was married to Margaret O'Brien. She was born 1806 in Ireland and immigrated in 1830. She is probably too young to be Miles O'Brien's sister and she isn't his daughter, unless he had a marriage before Mary Curry.⁶¹⁵⁷

• Baptized on same day as Margaret Giblin.⁶²¹⁵

• When they moved to Illinois, they had a good farm - the children all went to school. The counties held spelling bees and Aunt Lib was the best one in two counties - at one she spelled all down - old and young with the exception of her own teacher. She refused to spell "against my teacher."^{6, p 4, lines 159-162}

• When Civil War broke out, Lib's husband, Johnathan, who taught school, went as General Grant's private secretary. Aunt Lib taught at her husband's school and cared for her two little girls, Ada and Lilly.^{6, p 2, lines 49-56}

• Lena, Illinois, September 23rd, 1864

Provost Marshal

Dear Sir, I have just received a letter from my brother Miles O'Brien and enclosed I found a letter enclosed to my brother James, which I took the liberty to read, from its perusal? I find he is in some serious trouble the cause non-particulated? I cannot understand, as in his letter to me he said nothing about his trouble.

Will you have the kindness to tell me what crime he is guilty of, as I do not know to whom else I can apply. Oh! I feel so wretched and anxious and hardly know what to do.

Poor misguided boy: left an orphan at the age of 7 years without none to care, or watch over him and when I think of the training he must have received from those people that had him I cannot wonder that his habits are not what they should be.

It is ten years since he came to see me, and bade me goodbye and said, "I am going to Kansas, and when I am well? I am coming to see you."

I have never heard from him since till last fall, he wrote me a few lines, I was so glad for and then thought, I could write to him and try to influence him in the right path, by my letter never reached him, and when I again heard from him, it was from the Guard House, and it is too bad! I do sincerely hope his crime is not so serious as I fear it is.

I have one brother who has been in the service ever since the war broke out, and another came home to die last summer and we laid him by the side of his parents.

My husband is in Vicksburg Miss. in the Provost Marshall's office so you see I am alone, and do not know what to do. I fear you will think me troublesome, but I cannot help it I must ask from some one's help.

Do please write to me immediately, and help my brother if you can, poor erring fellow.

Hoping to hear from you very soon, I remain yours truly, Elizabeth B. Hay⁷⁷⁰⁴

• Bankruptcy Items.

In the matter of Jonathan Hay, Elizabeth Hay, wife of the bankrupt, filed a petition setting out that she owns a sewing machine, two horses, a harness, and a cow, which are in possession of the Assignee, and he has refused to give them up. She therefore asks that he may be compelled to do so. A rule on the Assignee to show cause was made returnable after five days' service.⁵⁹⁸⁹

• Mrs. Hay's examination showed that she was a very active practical manager, running a large and lucrative business of her own in the musical and sewing-machine line, and probably was the shrewder of the two.⁵⁹⁹⁰

John M. Bailey represented the bankrupt's assignee. Held by BLODGETT, District Judge:

That it appears clearly and conclusively from the evidence that Elizabeth Hay had been doing business separate and apart from the business of her husband for several years; that that business depended for its success upon Mrs. Hay's individual skill and energy, and consisted principally in the sale of sewing machines and musical instruments; that she had been remarkably successful in business, and by her energy, enterprise, and business tact, acquired credit in her business; that it was notorious that she was carrying on an independent business, and that she had supported not only herself and children, but her husband also, her husband having shown no remarkable ability in any direction except in the way of contracting debts. Mrs. Hay had also been for several years the owner of the homestead occupied by her family, and the title stood in her name. In the beginning of the year 1869 Jonathan Hay was indebted in large amounts, and all of Mrs. Hay's private property, acquired by her individual skill and labor, was sold to satisfy the claims of her husband's creditors, as prior to the year 1869 the earnings of the wife belonged absolutely to the husband.

In 1869 the law was passed giving to married women their earnings absolutely. And Mrs. Hay again went to work. Her husband had no property whatever, and had made a failure of every business which he had undertaken. In the fall of 1871 Mr. Hay desired to open a music store, and to enable him to do so Mrs. Hay furnished him \$1,000-money which she had borrowed, giving a trust deed on her house to secure its payment. When Mr. Hay went into business, Mrs. Hay acted as his agent in the sale of sewing machines and musical instruments; and there was an express understanding and agreement that she should receive a specified commission on each sale made by her. The court remarked that this understanding was unnecessary, as the law gave her earnings with or without the husband's consent, and that the transactions must be regarded as if made by Jonathan Hay with a third party. The court also held that the proviso to the act of 1869, 'This act shall not be construed to give the wife any right to compensation for any labor performed for her husband *887 or minor children,' did not affect the questions in this case, but was only applicable to cases where there was no special agreement between a husband and wife as to her compensation, but that she having the right to her earnings could agree to work for her husband about his business as well as for a stranger. In July, 1873, Mrs. Hay purchased of her husband ten sewing machines, paying him therefor \$500 in cash, the money paid being borrowed on Mrs. Hay's individual credit, of a relative. The court said that, as there was not fraud alleged, none could be presumed, and that the purchase was fair and open, made in the usual course of business, and must be so regarded. He, therefore, was of opinion that the property belonged to Mrs. Hay, and an order was entered directing the assignee to return it to her. This decision is important, as the question whether a married woman was entitled to compensation for services performed for her husband as agent has never before been judicially passed upon.^{5974, pp. 3-4}

• In 1871, when Hay wished to start anew in business, his wife raised \$1,000 by a mortgage on her homestead, and gave it to him. there was an explicit understanding that her earnings should be her own.⁵⁹⁹¹

• Chicago, April 27.–An important decision was rendered in the U S District Court today by Judge Blodgett in a case involving the right of the wife or daughter of a bankrupt to hold against the assignee personal property given them by said bankrupt in payment of services rendered as his clerk or agent. In the case the assignee of Jonathan Hay, a dealer in sewing machines in Freeport, Ill., who having absconded was thrown into bankruptcy, seized upon a piano belonging to Hay's daughter and several sewing machines in possession of Mrs. Hay, which they claimed were turned over to them by the husband and father in payment of their services in his store. Judge Blodgett to-day decided that the plaintiffs were legally entitled to the goods in question, and ordered the assignee to return them to their possession. The case possesses additional interest from the fact that it has been conducted throughout on the part of the plaintiffs by Miss Alta M. Hulett, the lady lawyer of this city.^{5974, p 2,6018}

• Also found a news article in the Freeport newspaper from 1883, stating that Elizabeth Hay, now living in Seville, Ohio, is visiting Freeport. This places Elizabeth in Seville, Ohio, earlier than I thought.⁶⁴²⁶

• Letter from Elizabeth Hay to Amy Estelle Walter Eckart, 2509 Scott St., San Francisco [after 1900]:

My dear niece,

Your good letter just rec[eived]. I am so glad your husband goes home each evening. Something for you to look forward to. Mr. Redington leaves today for Sacramento to meet his wife and daughter who are expected to arrive there tomorrow. We have a fine Chinese cook. He is a "Christian" – wears his hair short. He is very nice and respectful. Has a wife and three children in this city. He lived with one family for fifteen years so you see he is not very young. He surprises us each day with his fine meals.

I think it is fine for your husband to have something to take up his time during vacation and earn a little money while his salary goes on just the same. I think father Eckart [William Roberts Eckart, b 1841] is a generous man to do so much for his children. I hope he may live many years as such men are scarce. He is generous and kind to his children. I hope Ada will let me go home by the first of June. Even if I leave here then it will be July before I reach Seville as I intend to stay a short time in Kansas and I may take in the Fair and then a short time in Chicago.

Alice left Cleveland last Thursday for home. Will stop in St. Louis on her way home where her father will meet her and show her the sights for a day of two and then home – and on her return she intends stopping off again to visit the Fair in earnest – and it may be she will find Walter there to meet her. Walter is now in Allegheny, Pa. where he went to superintend a plant to be built for the great pickle man. I think his name is Heinz or some such name. His factory covers acres of ground. Allegheny is just across the river from Pittsburgh. Is that the place Mr. Eckart is? We'll never mind my dear girl if you cannot go to this fair. You may be able to attend the next one. You are so happy anyway and you have the faculty of making others happy too, which is a great blessing. If you should come up here before I leave (which I hope you may) be sure and come and see me. Angele has the house in fine order, ready for the strangers and you should see their mail. Well, with love to yourself and husband. I am your loving aunt.

Elizabeth Hay^{6, pp. 7 & 8, lines 311-334}

• 19 Aug 1890; date of Declaration for Widow's Pension. Husband Jonathan Hay "has never been heard of or from by applicant since September 15, 1873. [She] believes him dead."^{5976, p 2}

• Elizabeth Hay must have been an amazing woman. She bought several parcels of land in and around Freeport, Ill. always in her name. Remember that in 1890, she is shown living with son Walter Hay in Chicago. However, three years prior, she started buying property and swapping property in Seville, Ohio. She bought the Seville Town Hall for \$2500 from a bank in Cleveland, subject to the right of the Village of Seville to use the second floor for its business. My cousins in Chagrin Falls, Ohio report that when they were growing up in Seville, all of their school plays and dances were held there, but they never knew great-granny had owned the property. Downstairs, the property was used by a bank and three other businesses. I assume that she bought the property for its value in rental income.

The other Seville, Ohio property consisted of a number of lots near the train tracks on Washington Street. She built 2 houses. In one house, a tiny cottage, she built for her mother-in-law, Sarah Newton, (Jonathan's mother) and also Sarah Loomis, who I think was Jonathan's grandmother. Elizabeth lived next door, in the house where my father was born. Maybe Elizabeth figured that when Jonathan came sniffing around for his inheritance, E.H. would be there with open arms to greet him. When I parsed out the deeds I recalled my father saying something about Elizabeth having her mother-in-law next door.

Elizabeth died of heart disease.

As for the house in Chicago, in the Englewood section, it is within 3 blocks of the University of Chicago, which opened its doors in 1890. It's also within a few blocks of the Illinois Institute of Technology, and several other universities. I suspect that Elizabeth set up housekeeping here so that Walter could be educated. This is just a hunch. I drove around the neighborhood. Looked like mostly new houses in 1880-1890--no commercial section, just lots of colleges.⁶¹⁵⁰

• Elizabeth sold her property in Freeport in 1885. She attempted to file the deed as from Elizabeth and Jonathan (late husband) and when that didn't fly, Oscar Taylor, local bigwig lawyer, who had married her when he was a justice of the peace, made a notation in the margin of the deed that he had, that day, witnessed the signing of a power of attorney from Jonathan to Oscar, and then Oscar signed the deed as attorney in fact for Jonathan. Ha! Love that "home cookin."⁶¹⁵⁰

 \bullet There was no estate record for Elizabeth Hay or Sarah Newton in Medina County, $\rm Ohio.^{6150}$

• Seville, Ohio is a tiny town, population fewer than 500, south of Cleveland, Ohio, on the Wayne County and Medina County border. Jonathan Hay was born in the Seville area in 1830. Elizabeth Hay, born in Berkshire, Vermont, December 2, 1831, removed to Stephenson County, Illinois, circa 1840, first buys property in Seville (her husband's home-town) from her mother-in-law, Sarah Newton, on July 14, 1887. On November 18, 1899, Elizabeth conveys one of her lots to Sarah A. Loomis for \$500. My father once told me that his grandmother, Elizabeth Hay, built a cottage next to Elizabeth's home on Washington Street, Seville, for her mother-in-law, and her husband's grandmother, where she tended to them in their old age. My father was born in Elizabeth Hay's house on Washington Street. (It is the last house on the block, next to the railroad tracks.) It was conveyed, on December 6, 1907, to Alice Leaton Hay, but not to Walter, by Ada Hay Redington after the death of Elizabeth Hay.^{6283, p 2; footnote 1}

• [excerpts] Ceilan Milo Spitzer was educated in the schools of Medina, O., whither his family had removed in 1851, and at Oberlin College. He entered upon his active business career in 1869 by purchasing a half interest in a drug store at Seville, O., which he sold out two years later, and with his father opened the Seville Exchange Bank under the style of C. M. Spitzer & Co., a banking house which obtained immediate standing and reputation in the financial world. In 1877 a branch bank was opened at Medina, O., and in 1878 the German-American Bank of Cleveland, O., was organized, the last enterprise growing in such immediate favor that Mr. Spitzer purchased the interest of Ludwig Wideman, who had become partner in 1878, and during the next two years conducted a general banking and investment business. In January, 1880, owing to financial depression, the bank failed and soon after settled with its creditors on a forty per cent. basis. Ten years later, however, quite without legal or moral necessity, Mr. Spitzer paid all the bank's debts in full, an act which has deservedly given him a high reputation in the business world.^{5806, pp 376-7}

• In January, 1900, Gov. George K. Nash appointed him quartermaster-general of Ohio, with rank of brigadier-general.^{5806, p 277}

• Ceilan Milo Spitzer, co-founder of Spitzer, Rorick & Company, was a prominent merchant and banker who contributed to the material development of Northwest Ohio.

Spitzer & Company became a very successful business. They were the first company west of New York City to engage in the buying and selling of bonds. It was

known as "the father of the municipal bond business in the middle west."⁵⁸¹¹

• "he was a notter." 5926

• She [my mother] also said that Aunt Ada got Spitzer his job – he was Lillian's first husband - "the rotter"; she has a photo of him and he looks "like a weasle." Dad told her that Spitzer would send the Hay boys his worn out socks, and that Grandmother Hay (Alice Hay) would darn them and the boys would wear them.⁵⁹¹⁴

• The weirdest thing that happened was on my first night out. Using the navigator system in my Prius, I searched for motels and up pops "C. Spitzer Bed and Breakfast" in Medina. Yes, yes! It was Ceilan Milo Spitzer's home. The proprietress put me in Lillian's room, but it was Lillian the trophy wife and not Lillie Hay, the first wife. The house was built in 1890, and must have been a real slap in the face of Lillie Hay, when she came home dragging her tail and two kids, to go live with Elizabeth Hay in Seville, just down the road. The house is an elaborate stick Victorian, and is known to be haunted (probably by Elizabeth and Lillie!) The owner knew nothing about the first wife and said she had done extensive research and never saw any mention of a first wife.⁶¹⁵⁰

• When May was Mrs. Amy she and Emily had written always to their cousins Ada and Lilly. So she wrote asking Aunt Lib and Ada to visit her in San Francisco. Aunt Lib and son Walter were with us in Vallejo most of the time; but Ada found a beautiful bedroom prepared for her - in blue - so she stayed on and on - she was engaged to Sam Putnam, a neighbor when she came. Mr. Redington, a lifelong friend of Mr. Amy's cut him out. Sam Putnam was so crushed, he volunteered to go on the boat sent to find the "Jeanette" - I believe it was the "Rogers." Mr. Redington went back East to marry Ada - this was after the "break-up."^{6, p 6, lines 235-242}

• Aunt Ada settled a trust on the Hay boys, but did not give the money to her brother Walter, because he would blow it on patents, so sent it to Grandmother Hay. The trust paid for things like music lessons once a week at the Cleveland Conservatory, and is how Daddy went to Ohio Wesleyan University. Grandmother would drive the boys from Seville, Ohio to Cleveland for music lessons! Later, when the family moved to Sandusky, the trust bought Grandmother a Model A, and she tooled around in that. Once, when Dad was a boy, they set off from Seville, Ohio to Chillicothe, Missouri, and somewhere along the rutted road, they lost a wheel. A new wheel had to be sent for, so the family camped in the car for a week, parked in a schoolyard, until the new wheel arrived. Mom thinks this was about 1915.⁵⁹¹⁴

• I meant to tell you that in one of my emails to you awhile back, I said something to the effect that my father and his brothers went to college from a trust from Aunt Ada Hay Redington. You put it on your tree. That is not exactly correct, as I have learned recently. There was a trust which covered certain things. But, Aunt Ada died in April of 1929, and each of the boys received a bequest from her, in addition to the trust. I found a ledger where my Dad would take funds from it to pay for his tuition. Each time, his father carefully subtracted, and kept a running balance. The trust kept paying out money to my grandmother Hay for her whole life, per my mother. My own recollection is that Grandmother, whatever her finances were, was tighter than a drum. My mother remembers being invited for dinner during the six-week courtship with my Dad. Grandmother had a plate of chicken, and when Mom reached for a second piece, she got the cold fish-eye from Alice. Mom interpreted the stare that Mom was not to take a second piece. I wonder if the stare came because Mom had not been offered a second piece. Our family has always been long on good manners and protocol. I guess she also didn't approve of the pace of the courtship. My Dad was her favorite son!⁶⁴²⁸

• Her [Elizabeth Hay] son, Walter, age 15, is, in 1885, living with his Uncle James O'Brien in Minnesota. Maybe he was just visiting for the summer.⁶⁴²⁶

• Walter Hay filed for his first patent 11 May 1891, for an electric bell. He was 21, and living in Chicago. I surely wish I knew what he was doing there in those years. He filed a second in 1892 and a third in 1893.

On the patent application filed from Erie, Pa., by my grandfather, Walter Hay, it is Patent No. 893,240, filed 13 May 1907, and granted 14 July 1908. It is for a "Detachable Chain."

Checking the 1900 census, Walter Hay was living in Grand Rapids, Mi., and is listed as a mechanical engineer. By then, he had patented 9 inventions. I wrote to the Grand Rapids Historical Society to inquire what sort of industries were there at that time.

Grand Rapids was known as a furniture-making center. I'll let you know if I hear anything. 6428

• The history lady in Grand Rapids writes that the 1900 directory lists Walter Hay as a "designer," but does not list an employer, as it does for others. He was living as a boarder with his wife and baby, with the Devore family, widow and young girl. Looking at the dates the three patents were finally issued for his car, 10 April 1900, which were fully assigned to Emerson Morse Hotchkiss, and finding him in Grand Rapids, Michigan in June of 1900, makes me believe he must have had a terrible falling out with Hotchkiss. News articles indicate the Hay and Hotchkiss Company had purchased a manufacturing plant in New Haven for \$30,000. The first car seems to have been begun in 1898, and rolled off the assembly line in the summer of 1899. (Fountainhead Antique Car Museum attributes the date to 1898.)⁶⁴²⁹

• The first letter from Mr. Dix, written when Walter was 20, in Dec of 1890, suggests the cloud Walter lived under--perhaps a reference to his absconded father and grandfather. "I'm not surprised that such is the case for I have always had faith in you from the start--even when nearly every body was prophesying evil for you."⁶⁴³¹

• Walter is now in Allegheny, Pa. where he went to superintend a plant to be built for the great pickle man. I think his name is Heinz or some such name. His factory covers acres of ground. Allegheny is just across the river from Pittsburg.^{6, p 8, lines 326-328}

• The Chain Company originated in 1913 with Walter Hay, president, and John Lowrie, secretary. In 1915 it was reorganized. Abel Bostwick became president, W. G. Brumbaugh, secretary, and Walter Hay, manager. The company manufactured conveyor chains and sprocket wheels. They employed from fifteen to twenty-five men and occupied the site formerly owned by The M. E. Frazier Company. In 1922, the industry was removed to Sandusky, Ohio.^{5050, p 25}

• Walter invented the first 4-cylinder car in the United States, called the "Hay-Hotchkiss Horseless Carriage." He was an engineering genius.

Alice and Walter Hay lived in New Haven, CT in 1899, where their oldest daughter, Frances, was born on September 22, 1899.

They left New Haven, the story goes, because my grandfather got tired of the Yale University students hitting on my pretty grandmother.⁵⁹¹¹

• He was an inventor of cars. Founder of the Union Chain Co., Sandusky, Ohio. Died of a cerebral hemorrhage 2/8/1936, after being told by the Board of Directors of his company that he was being "retired." He went home, lay down on the sofa, and died. 5912

• THE HAY AND HOTCHKISS CO.

Walter Hay, a mechanical engineer of Seville, Ohio, inventor of a new hydrocarbon motor called the Hay Frictionless Gasolene Motor has associated with him E. M. Hotchkiss, of Waterbury, Conn., and the Hay & Hotchkiss Co., of New Haven, Conn., has been organized to manufacture the gasolene motor above-mentioned, motor vehicles and motor fire engines. The new company have purchased the factory formerly occupied by the B. Manville Carriage Co., corner of Wooster and Wallace streets, for the sum of \$30,000, and are employing about a dozen hands in the construction of their first vehicle. Next spring it is their intention to largely augment this force and add much machinery.

The motor, of 5 HP., weighs 240 pounds, rather more than is necessary, Mr. Hay thinks, and has a 70 pound fly wheel. It requires no cooling water, runs very smoothly, and no injury will result if it is unoiled for months. There are four cylinders, which are cleansed after each explosion, thus obviating odor, and by the use of a muffler, which has no retarding effect, the exhaust cannot be heard 20 feet away from the motor.

Speed is regulated by means of compressed air, and the sparking device works automatically, no spark being produced unless an impulse is needed.

The carriage of the new company will be similar to other leading makes of gasoline vehicles in its general operation, although it is their intention to improve greatly upon the one here illustrated.⁶³⁴⁸

• I am sending you a picture of the Hay-Hotchkiss car, in a separate email. I located one a few years ago--it's owned by J. William Middendorf, in Rhode Island. I think he was Secretary of the Navy under Tricky Dick. He's very ancient. I talked to him a few years ago about coming to visit the car, as it is the only one in existence.⁵⁹¹⁴

• My grandfather's car, the Hay-Hotchkiss Horseless Carriage, has been acquired from Admiral J. William Middendorf, by the Fountainhead Antique Auto Museum in Fairbanks, Alaska. It arrived there recently and I have been working with them to host a reception next summer in honor of my grandfather Walter Hay.⁶²⁸³

• Walter and Alice and little Frannie came here the 20th of December to spend the holidays. Frannie was taken sick and for four weeks she was at death's door. Two physicians gave her up. We were all worn out with anxiety and watching and now she seems as well as ever. She is 18 months old today. I think they froze her almost to death taking her out in the severest weather an hour at a time - but she had a showy cap and lovely white fur robes which was all show instead of warmth and she came down with inflammation of lungs, stomach and bowels. Oh, such a sick child. We had such an excellent Dr. often staying with her all night. Well I hope they will

not repeat it, if they do they will have no Frannie.^{6, p 11, lines 477-484}

• [excerpts] It is interesting to me how the family traditions continued, of keeping a close watch over the daughters. Walter Hay, my grandfather, was overly protective of his daughter, my Aunt Fanny. The story was re-told, a thousand times, how, when Fanny finished high school, she was sent out to California (about 1917) to stay with Cousin Louise, and help her with the care of Bill Hewlett, who was 4, and a handful. She stayed for 3 years, until age 21. Aunt Fanny told me herself that she was never out of the site of a female chaperone, and that they took her around California to see the Spanish historical sites, to art museums, hear concerts, and introduce her to the finer things of life, which she loved. The reason behind the trip was that Sam Medina (pronounced Ma deena, and not Ma dinah, like the county that bears his family name--and Seville is now in Medina County and not Wayne Co. as it was 100 years ago--) who was a music teacher, college educated, and very Italian Catholic, came courting Aunt Fanny and she liked him. Grandfather Walter had Fanny on the next train to San Francisco!

After they married, he took Aunt Fanny out to Saturday night dinner every week, come rain or shine. I used to go for a long visit down to the farm every summer. She always wore dresses and stockings, no matter how hot it was. When she came to Sandusky to visit us, usually for Sunday Dinner, I recall she always chose to sit in a straight-back chair. "I prefer a straight chair," she would say. Aunt Ada and Cousin Louise taught her it was better for her posture to sit in a straight-back chair instead of schlumping in an easy chair. I can see her now, sitting with her knees together, ankles crossed and slightly to the side, her hands quietly resting in her lap. She taught me that a lady never crosses her legs. She didn't "put on airs" like Elizabeth O'Brien, but was just genteel, in the most lovely, quiet way. She got John Chambers to drink his coffee out of a china cup instead of a mug!⁵⁹⁴³

• We were close with Fanny and John. Once a month, Daddy would take his mother to Seville, and Fanny would keep her for a week, and then Fanny would bring her back and stay over, as Seville was about 2 hours away. We had "Sunday Dinner"--the long drawn-out ordeal that kids hate--twice a month, once at Fanny's and once at our home. Fanny had that dinner on the table at 1:00 P.M. and you could set your watch by it. My mother, a much younger woman, with artistic temperament (the trophy wife for my dad!) had a more leisurely approach, but you could see Uncle John taking the sneaky looks at his pocket watch as the dial eased down toward 1:30

P.M.⁵⁹⁷⁹

• Alice recounts that her mother Fanny, was courted by Sam Masi of Medina, not Sam Medina, of Medina, as I [previously] told you. Alice says that Sam Masi became a coach in a local high school, that he was quite handsome, but swarthy and "foreignlooking" and "our family didn't 'do' foreign." She recalls being told that Sam Masi was run off twice with a shotgun: one time he came courting to the front door, and Grandpa Hay greeted him with the shotgun and ordered him not to come around again. Alice believes that her mother continued to flirt with Sam, and that Sam, undaunted by Grandpa Hay's brandishing of the shotgun, waited until Grandpa was out of town, and tried to crawl into Fanny's second-floor bedroom window of the house in Seville, using a ladder. The family heard some noise outside, and our Grandmother Hay greeted Sam with a shotgun to his forehead when his face appeared at the open window on the second floor. Shortly thereafter Fanny was shipped out to California. Alice says that years later, Sam Masi appeared suddenly showed up at the house where Fanny now lived with her husband John Chambers, and his appearance caused "quite a bit of consternation in the family." Alice said that her Dad was terribly jealous of Sam Masi, and just the mention of Sam's name would get a rise out of John Chambers.⁵⁹⁸³

• Frances married a prosperous fruit farmer.⁵⁹¹¹

• In the meantime, John Chambers, her eventual husband, started buddying up to my Dad and his twin, Bill, although John Chambers was much older (Daddy and Bill were about 7 or 8 or 10 when they left Seville for Sandusky). Chambers would play ball with the boys and taught them both to drive his truck, tractor and car when they were still in the grades. The year Fanny was to return to Seville from California, Chambers started building himself an enormous house on Seville Pike, with the help of his many brothers, two of which were "slow," and about whom John Chambers would say they were "halfwits." Anyway, when Fanny got home from California, who should appear but Sam Medina, the Italian (but born in this country) to court Fanny. Grandfather Walter Hay got out his shotgun and met Sam on the porch and suggested he should not be coming around again. John Chambers was hanging around with the boys in the yard. Then Grandfather put John Chambers in charge of escorting Fanny here and there and to be on the lookout for the no-good Sam Medina. John Chambers, on the first Sunday after Fanny got home, asked Grandfather to take her buggy-riding out to see his new house. (He always drove a big gas-guzzling Buick, so the buggy-ride must have been a ruse so he could have more time with her.) When she saw the house, she asked him why he built such a large house--it had 6 bedrooms on the second floor, and he told her he wanted to impress her so she would marry him. He didn't have the looks, but he had the bucks, and a bit of good-humored chutzpa. He was the largest fruit farmer in Medina County. After they married, he took Aunt Fanny out to Saturday night dinner every week, come rain or shine.⁵⁹⁴³

• Uncle John built the most lovely genteel house for Aunt Fanny before they were married. It had wrap-around porches outside, plus a back kitchen porch where Aunt Fanny and I would sit and snap beans in the summer. Inside the front door, guests were greeted by a wonderful side hallway, with the staircase sitting to the right and sweeping upstairs into an equally large hallway, with the bedrooms off the hall. They had parquet floors, beautiful moldings, built-in china cabinets. There was a maid's staircase that led down to the kitchen. They had a butler's pantry, and Aunt Fanny had quite a collection of beautiful china and lovely things. I think she picked up her taste for fine things being squired about in California by Cousin Louise when she lived out there. She probably wrote to John from California and described all of the Redington accoutrements in detail, and meeting those likes kept him and his

brothers busy for most of a winter!⁵⁹⁷⁹

• John Chambers was 4 or 5 years older than Aunt Fanny. While he tended to make fun of her taste in "long-hair" music, he always saw to it that she had the latest Magnavox hi-fidelity record player, and built an antenna for her so that she could hear Karl Haas on the radio --I don't remember if he broadcast from Detroit or Ann Arbor, but the Earth stopped in our family every time his "Adventures in Good Music" came on, whether in Fanny's house or our house.⁵⁹⁷⁹

• Alice recounts that her father, John Chambers, owned the largest farm in Guilford Township, Seville, Ohio, and that his family attended the same church in Seville as did Walter and Alice Hay.⁵⁹⁸³

• My father loved the latest inventions, and we were always the first one on the block to get the biggest most fabulous Hi-Fi or TV. He bought the first television and invited the whole neighborhood in to watch television, and they sat there in straight chairs like they were at the movies! He kept inviting them back, and mom put up a howl once she saw her roll in all this was hostess serving the drinks and popcorn!⁵⁹⁷⁹

• Dad was the first twin. Dad told us that it took some time for his parents to select names, and that, at first, they were called "Pete" and "Re-Pete."⁶³³³

She says she has an original letter written by Elizabeth O'Brien written to Walter Hay (she thinks) explaining what Jonathan was doing in the Civil War, and why there was the big gap of years between Lillian, Ada and Walter. My mother is blind now, so asking her to look for something is like asking Helen Keller for help.⁵⁹¹⁴

• My mother, a much younger woman, with artistic temperament (the trophy wife for my dad!) had a more leisurely approach, but you could see Uncle John taking the sneaky looks at his pocket watch as the dial eased down toward 1:30 P.M.⁵⁹⁷⁹

• My mother went into the hospital and is now in a nursing home in Sandusky, Ohio. I am so sad about it I can hardly stand it. Mother is perfectly lucid but was no longer caring for herself. She acknowledges she did not realize how ill she had become. She's blind and in a wheelchair.⁶²⁸³

June R. Schlicter Hay, 86, passed away unexpectedly, February 3, 2012, at Parkvue Health Care Center, Sandusky, Ohio. Following a private committal service, the Rev. David Aber officiating, she was laid to rest at Oakland Cemetery, next to her husband John, who preceded her in death in 1999.

A Memorial Service will be held Saturday, February 18, 2012, at 11:00 A.M., at First

Presbyterian Church, Sandusky, for family, neighbors and friends. Mrs. Hay's former students are warmly invited to attend, and to share memories of her teaching experiences.

Mrs. Hay taught English, at Sandusky High School in the 1960's and 1970's. She taught college-preparatory American literature to high school juniors, instilling in them a love for the written and spoken word. She pushed her students to write with clarity and flair. She insisted they read American classics, as part of the American Studies curriculum she developed with the late Fred Leffler and Don Nath.

In 1966, she wanted her students to read To Kill a Mockingbird, the Pulitzer Prizewinning novel by Harper Lee, about racial injustice in small-town Alabama during the 1930's, but was prevented from doing so by the Board of Education, because it deemed the book too controversial. In the same period, she was allowed to assign Gone with the Wind, the 1936 romance novel by Margaret Mitchell, set during the Civil War in Georgia, to a different class, most of whom had never read a book. Teaching it took the spring semester, but she enjoyed acting out the scenes in class with her students.

Mrs. Hay went to unusual lengths to connect with American authors for the benefit of her students. One summer, she traveled with her family to Oxford, Mississippi, and knocked on the door of William Faulkner, a winner of the Nobel Prize for Literature. She hoped for a few words with him she could carry home to her students about his books Light in August and As I Lay Dying. She was thrilled to see him peeking at her from behind the door as she talked with Mrs. Faulkner, who relayed answers from him.

Following her retirement from teaching, she worked for a time as a caseworker for Erie County Children's Services. She self-studied and passed the state license exam, despite having no academic background in social work.

June Rose Schlicter Hay was born June 28, 1925, in Atlantic City, N.J., to Elsie Matilda (Sheafer) and Carl Frederick Schlicter, the eldest of four children. She was the Valedictorian of her eighth grade class, and thereby won admittance to the prestigious all-academic Philadelphia High School for Girls, graduating in 1941, at the age of sixteen. Following graduation, she entered Pennsylvania Hospital School of Nursing, hoping for a career as an army nurse. Two bouts of rheumatic fever ended her hopes for a nursing career, but she won a scholarship to Lincoln Memorial University in Tennessee, where she lived in the home of the college president, and served as a companion for his daughter. While at Lincoln Memorial, she won the coveted Dr. Reese Patterson Memorial Award in an annual contest for the best declamation, with "O Brother Man!" by John Greenleaf Whittier. Her prize was ten dollars.

With her prize money, she bought a bus ticket from Tennessee to Cedar Point with her sorority sisters, to wait tables, for the summer. There, on her twentieth birthday, she met John W. Hay, who was moonlighting as a saxophone player in a Cedar Point band. He was the love of her life. She married him ten weeks later, on September 15, 1945. They were married 53 years, until Mr. Hay's death in 1999.

While raising a family, Mrs. Hay returned to college, graduating magna cum laude from Bowling Green State University in 1959, then worked toward a master's degree in English.

Mrs. Hay held numerous leadership roles in various Sandusky organizations. She was a former president of the Women's Civic Club, and vice-president of the College Women's Club. She served on the Session of First Presbyterian Church, where she was also a member of Presbyterian Women. For decades she was involved with the Harlequins Community Theatre, where she directed plays, including William Inge's Dark at the Top of the Stairs, and several children's plays. In 1951, she won the "Outstanding Actress" Award. She played the lead in various Harlequins productions. Tall, slim, and red-haired, she came alive on the stage.

Mrs. Hay became close friends with Beverly Buck Mayer in the Harlequins. When Beverly's daughter, "Jackie," won the Miss Ohio pageant and went on to compete in the Miss America pageant, Mrs. Hay traveled with the family entourage back to the city of her birth, and was present at Convention Hall when Jacquelyn Jeanne Mayer was crowned Miss America 1963. Mrs. Hay talked about this experience as one of the highlights of her life, as were her summer travels throughout the U.S., Canada, and Central America.

In more recent years, Mrs. Hay served as a volunteer for Stein Hospice, and as a guide at the Merry-Go-Round Museum. She particularly enjoyed the Book Discussion Group at Sandusky Library where she was an active participant for at least fifteen years.

During the 1980's, she and her husband lived first in Naples, Florida, and then in Hendersonville, N.C., where Mrs. Hay worked as a docent at the boyhood home of the author Thomas Wolfe in Asheville. The Hays returned to Sandusky in 1991, buying a house across the street from where they had raised their children.

A child of the Great Depression, Mrs. Hay made a game of saving money and

investing. She had an uncanny knack of picking winning stocks. She loved winning radio contests, and won so many times, WLEC asked her not to compete more than once a month. She constantly learned new things, read widely, and spoke her mind. Her memory for detail was remarkable. When her vision failed her, she used books on tape. She also called the Reference Desk at the Sandusky Library on a sometimes daily basis, challenging them to research subjects of interest to her.

Mrs. Hay had an indomitable will, and expected people to follow her lead. One Christmas she and her husband were guests of the recently-retired President of Guatemala, in Guatemala City. She suffered from an elevator phobia, and when she insisted on descending fifteen flights of stairs, he gallantly accompanied her, with a retinue of security guards trailing them. She made no apology.

Until the time of her death, Mrs. Hay enjoyed relationships with her former students, who wrote to her and visited with her. She rarely missed the opportunity to correct poor grammar. "You get one chance to make a good impression," she would say.

In addition to her husband and parents, Mrs. Hay was predeceased by her sister Margaret. She is survived by her children John W. Hay, Jr., (Jill) of Columbus, and Martha, of Greenwich, Ct., and four grandchildren, John, Emily, Thornton, and Rose. She is also survived by her brothers Carl David Schlicter (Margaret) and John Schlicter (Suzanne), and several nieces, a nephew, and cousins.

Arrangements were by Pfiel Funeral Home of Sandusky. Mrs. Hay's family thanks the caregivers at Parkvue Health Care Center for their care, and the reference librarians at Sandusky Public Library for their humor and patience. The family requests that memorial contributions be made to the Sandusky Public Library.⁶⁷⁰⁶

• [excerpts] Bill Hewlett, co-founder with David Packard of Hewlett-Packard, died January 12, 2001. As one of the preeminent entrepreneurs of the past century, it seems fitting to add his story to our "Entrepreneurs of Note" in honor of his accomplishments.

William Redington Hewlett was born May 20, 1913, in Ann Arbor, Mich. He moved to California at age 3, when his father, a physician, joined the faculty at Stanford Medical School. As a boy, Hewlett showed a keen interest in science, conducting many physics and chemistry experiments and demonstrations. In 1930, he enrolled at Stanford University.

Hewlett became friends with David Packard during their undergraduate days at Stanford. While at Stanford, both Hewlett and Packard were influenced strongly by the teaching of one of their professors, Frederick E. Terman, a pioneer in the field of radio engineering. At Terman's urging, the two young men explored starting an electronics company. On Jan. 1, 1939, they founded Hewlett-Packard Company. The company's first "plant" was a small garage in Palo Alto, and the initial capital amounted to \$538. The legendary garage -- designated the birthplace of Silicon Valley -- is a California state historical landmark.

The graduate thesis Hewlett wrote while at Stanford -- which focused on practical

applications for the new electrical-engineering technology of negative feedback became the basis for HP's first product, the audio oscillator. One of the young company's first orders was from Walt Disney Studios, which used eight of the products to develop the state-of-the-art soundtrack for the movie "Fantasia." Despite their lack of business experience, the two entrepreneurs realized a modest profit in their first year in business -- starting an unbroken string of 61 consecutive years in the black.

Hewlett resigned as president in 1977 and retired as chief executive officer in 1978. He then served as chairman of HP's executive committee until 1983, when he became vice chairman of the HP board of directors. In 1987, he was named director emeritus.

Throughout his HP career, Hewlett was a constant presence at HP Laboratories, often working side by side with the engineers at the company's research center. He was known for his uncanny ability to understand how new technologies could become successful products in the marketplace.

His contributions have made a difference in each of our lives, not only technologically, but in style of management. In his "Random Thoughts on Creativity" he shares his vision of what nourishes creativity, the spark of entrepreneurism. His leadership has opened the doors for entrepreneurs everywhere.⁴⁶⁸²

• [excerpts] He attended Lowell High School and was accepted at Stanford University as a favor to his late father, Albion Walter Hewlett, who had died prematurely of a brain tumor in 1925.

He was a member of the Kappa Sigma fraternity during his time at Stanford and MIT.

Hewlett attended classes taught by Fred Terman at Stanford and became acquainted with David Packard during his undergraduate work at Stanford. He and Packard began discussing forming a company in August of 1937, and formally incorporated Hewlett-Packard Company on January 1, 1939.

He was President of HP from 1964 to 1977, and served as CEO from 1968 to 1978, when he was succeeded by John A. Young. He remained chairman of the executive committee until 1983, and then served as vice chairman of the board until 1987.⁵⁹¹⁰

• Bill Hewlett, another engineering genius in the family, who was, incidentally, totally dyslexic. He got through Stanford University by having private tutors read him his lessons. He was an absolutely down-to-earth man, who, despite his billions, got

Born in 1919, Rosemary leaves a long legacy of contribution and accomplishment. That legacy will live on through her generosity of spirit, the love of her family and friends, and her many philanthropic endeavors.⁶⁷⁴⁵

Alice, on the other hand, at 84, is still working (!) at the Hamlet Retirement Village, where she is the receptionist and Major Domo. She put me up as a guest in the Village (a surreal experience--have never stayed in a nursing home before) and told me a lot of things about life in Seville. She also gave me a fistful of pictures of my dad, greatly appreciated. She says that when she was a girl, her friends were cousins. The Chambers farms owned by the various Chambers brothers (at least 3, maybe 4) covered a large part of the area. (The guy at the historical society said that the Chambers Fruit Farm, owned by John and Fanny Chambers, my uncle and aunt, was the largest in Ohio, not just Medina County, and that it contained nearly 3000 acres in its heyday.) It was her impression that their family was just like other families, in that the families stuck together, whether they liked each other or not. Marriage linked the family to another family. They looked out for one another. Holidays (in the summer months) were huge affairs. She did not think it surprising that Elizabeth Hay would "take in" her mother-in-law. After all, Sarah Newton had only one son, and he bailed out. She said again that she knew nothing about the scam with Jonathan Hay, and had no pictures. Her sister Beth gave all the historical pictures to my Cousin Diane and I will do my best to get copies from her.^{6150, p 2}

• The trip is ON to Alaska, with a reception to take place on or about August 22, 2010 (140th birthday of Walter Hay.) I'm taking all my kids, Emily's fiance and my Ex (so long as he behaves!) So far, Diane Hay Burley is bringing her grown kids. My brother is going with his wife. Son of Alice Chambers Stone, Tommy Stone, who lives in Seattle is coming with his wife. (Haven't seen him in 50 years.) I think Alice will also come. She's the one who's 85 and still works. Tommy suggests we meet in Anchorage and drive to Fairbanks, then go on to Denali. Haven't heard from the others. I have a master list with 44 or 45 people on it.⁶²⁸⁴

I meant to tell you that I was nosing around in Ohio history and found this wonderful history of Wood County, Ohio. There are

http://www.heritagepursuit.com/Wood/WoodChapXXVIII.htm numerous references to Jonathan Hay, (the grandfather of Jonathan Loomis Hay) and how he and some pals left Wayne Co., Ohio in the winter of 1833 and went prospecting for land in Wood Co., which is about 65 miles due west from Seville, Ohio. He owned some land in Wayne Co., that shows up on the land grant records.

Wood Co is an old stomping grounds for me, as one of the state universities is at Bowling Green, and I have spent many a lost weekend there! That area is still known as "The Black Swamp" because it used to be a marshy, swampy area. I recall that even in the early '70's, a mist hung over the land in the morning that was so thick you'd think you were in San Francisco.

This article prints out at 24 pages, and I did a fairly close reading today, while waiting for my case to be called. J. Hay is mentioned several times in the first 6 pages. On page 20 and 21, you'll read about the terrible winter of 1843 when they nearly froze to death--all the pigs died, etc. Jonathan Hay. I suspect he tried a little land speculation, sold off the property and moved on. He's in the 1840 Wood Co. census in Bloom TP and also in Wayne TP, which would probably be important to establish that you had lived on the land for so many years. Anyway, it's fairly amusing. Enjoy!⁵⁹¹⁷

• Jonathan Hay's Will of 1861 (this is the father of Sarah Hay Loomis Newton) grants to Sarah Anne Newton \$700, and a rigmarole about allowing her to buy some portion of land where she lives, and a bed. Daughter Eunice Abigail Ault also receives a bed, and \$700, less the money he already gave her. (This Eunice Abigail Ault, wife of David, is the one who takes Jonathan Loomis Hay to Freeport.) Son Walter Hay, the physician with no kids, ended up with the household goods, the livestock, all the real estate. Jonathan Hay's Will asked for a big tombstone on his grave (and he got it!) Jonathan and Sarah each got to share the old man's buggy.⁶¹⁵⁰, p_2

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
