• In 1803, at the age of 19, Ward went to Syracuse and engaged in shipping army supplies on Lake Ontario. In 1821 Ward persuaded the Gallaghers to come to Michigan.<sup>3650</sup>

- An early settler of Manlius, New York.<sup>950</sup>
- 1818 shipbuilding was begun by [unclear] Keyes and Capt. Samuel Ward.<sup>540</sup>

• Captain Sam Ward began his career of shipbuilding for the lake by launching at Conneaut in 1818 a twenty-seven-ton schooner, the *Salem*. He later moved on to the mouth of Belle River, above Detroit, turned out ships from his yards there, and was at one time owner of the largest fleet sailing on Lake Erie.<sup>1423</sup>

• He also adopted a girl, Jane E. Ward, who married David Gallagher.<sup>7</sup>

• The following spring my [Eber Ward] brother Samuel was going to Michigan, so I made him the best arrangement in my power for my children to remain at Conneaut, and came to Newport on St. Clair river with my brother and his family, early in May, 1819.

My brother Samuel was worth about \$3,000 when he moved to Newport, quite a large fortune for those days.

At that time there were at Newport, William Gallagher, James B. Wolverton, Bela Knapp, Samuel Ward, and myself and our families.

In 1823 my brother Sam, and William Gallagher built a sawmill and grist-mill, the first mills in that section of country.<sup>1370</sup>

• Here is some dope about our ancestors, Sam Ward and William Gallagher. These men lived in New York State previous to 1820, and they married sisters named Lamerson. In 1821 Sam Ward came and located in Newport, which is now Marine City. He sent word back to Gallagher to come with the women. So they all settled in Newport in 1821.<sup>544</sup>

#### Capt. Samuel WARD

• Capt. Samuel Ward came to the mouth of Belle River in 1820, and laid out the village of Newport (now Marine City) in 1831. This was the second village on the St. Clair. Although it did not grow much for several years, it has recently come to be quite a town, and is noted for its ship-building. More steamboats and sail vessels have been built in these ship-yards than anywhere else in the State.

Why the remarkable success of so heavy business men at Newport or Marine City? I think it originated mainly from old Capt. Samuel Ward. He was scrupulously honest, frugal and industrious, and he spared no patience to impress the importance of these things upon everybody around him. He seemed to magnetize everybody with his spirit, and inculcate them with an insatiable desire to make money. When I first knew him, he was a man of very moderate means, and dept a tavern at Belle River, on one of the old French farms which he had bought, and on which he had laid out his village. When he died he was a millionaire.<sup>29</sup>

• Samuel Ward located eighty acres in Section 2 in 1833.<sup>29</sup>

• About the year 1819, I think, Capt. Samuel Ward came to the township. He built a house of round logs where Dr. Haddin's house now stands. It was, indeed, a primitive structure, contained but one partition, and was covered with oak shake. His family at that time consisted of his wife and son Harrison. Soon after Capt. Ward was settled, a brother-in-law by the name of Gallagher came, he being the father of David and John Gallagher.

Capt. Sam was the king of this community, arbitrator of all disputes, and so long as he could control, business was quite decent; but he could not, nor would he allow any one else to raise above dependency upon himself if he could help it; yet, notwithstanding this, he was socially very agreeable, and always made friends of those he wished to defeat.<sup>29</sup>

• My Uncle Samuel, being ungovernable, would not attend school, but ran away from home to Lake Ontario at seventeen or eighteen years of age, and never fully learned to read or write, but in his business life learned to sign his name in his way, being devoid of all literary attainments. My Uncle Samuel left Lake Ontario before the close of the war of 1812, residing at Salina, N. Y., and boiled salt there for a while. He married there "Aunt Betsey," and afterwards moved to Northern Ohio at or near Conneaut, and finally moved to Michigan and settled at Newport (now Marine City) on the St. Clair River. He engaged there in farming, small merchandising, building and navigating small sail craft on the Lakes, and eventually in building, owning and navigating first-class passenger steamers, and buying much pine land from the United States. He died at Marine City at nearly seventy years of age, and willed nearly all of this property of about one million dollars to a

son of Uncle Eber's, named Eber B. Ward, who was my cousin.<sup>3595,3614</sup>

• At the time of our arrival at Newport, Uncle Sam was worth from sixty to eighty thousand dollars, a fortune comparatively in financial power and consequence much more than that of a millionaire of to-day. He owned two good schooners, the General Harrison and the Marshall Ney, considerable stock in the large steamboat Michigan, was running a store of general assortment, and had a large, well-cleared up and well-located stock and grain farm located between the St. Clair and Belle Rivers, the village of Newport being laid out on the South end of the same. He had lately made a sale to an Ohio company of another portion of his large farm for fifteen thousand dollars, and soon built a brick house at a cost of eight thousand dollars, and had other property and lands, and was out of debt. His family consisted of his wife "Aunt Betsey," who could neither read or write, and his son Harrison, "Hack" as he was called, then about twenty-one years of age, ......, and four of Aunt Betsey's orphan nieces named McQueen, at this time from ten to twenty-one years of age.<sup>3614</sup>

• Uncle Sam died in the winter of 1854, willing about all his estate to E. B. Ward, only leaving to his wife, Aunt Betsey, and his son "Hack" a small life-lease interest. Aunt Betsey and Hack lived but a few years after Uncle Sam's death, unnoticed by the neighbors and neglected by E. B. Ward.<sup>3614</sup>

• His will dated March 21, 1854 [sic] is on file in St. Clair County. He names wife, Elizabeth; son, Jacob Harrison Ward; nephews, John and David Gallagher; brother, Eber Ward; adopted daughter, Jane Ward; Eber Ward, son of Zael Ward; nephew, Eber B. Ward, and others not mentioned as relatives. He lived in Newport [now Marine City], St. Clair Co., Michigan.<sup>7</sup>

• He also adopted a girl, Jane E. Ward, who married David Gallagher.<sup>7</sup>

• Jane E. McQueen is listed as an adopted daughter of Capt. Samuel Ward - doubtless related closely to the rest of the McQueens - but I've not yet discovered the relationship.<sup>539</sup>

- Were Polly and Jane sisters?<sup>3226</sup>
- Mother's maiden name given as Ward.<sup>4431,4432</sup>

• Santa Clara Twp. rolls for 1910 show Jane E. Ward Gallagher, head of family, age 79, residing on Los Gatos Road and operating a prune orchard. Living with her are David C., Helen H., Fred E., and Emily W. Gallagher. None of these ever married, according to later Santa Clara cemetery records. The house was a large Victorian on the Los Gatos-Santa Clara Road, probably near its present intersection with Interstate 280. David, Sr. dropped from sight, and we have found no records of the deaths of Jane, David C., or Emily.<sup>3650</sup>

Basically, she died intestate.

According to the records, the state decided that Emily had three legal heirs. They were her brother, Ward, her niece Jennie H. Eliason (child of Jennie Gallagher Hamilton, deceased), and her niece Naomi Dafoe Spencer (child of Mary Gallagher Dafoe, deceased). (Jennie and Mary Gallagher were sisters of Emily's, according to the document.) These three split the estate between them equally...the residue of the estate was \$1,696.62.

Another document said that Jennie H. Eliason was living in the Montgomery Apartments, Apt B-21, Narberth, PA and that Naomi D. Spencer was at 319 Washington Ave, Alpena, MI. (This was in mid-1944.)

A notice from the tax appraisers file said that Emily's assets (before creditors were paid) was cash of \$1,651.95 and interest in the estat of Fred E. Gallagher of \$318.25. There was no real estate...so that big house and orchard near the Winchester Mystery house must have been sold earlier.<sup>4512</sup>

• In the autumn of 1818 I started with my family from Vermont to go to Kentucky. When we reached Waterford, Pa., my wife was taken sick and in twenty-four hours was a corpse, leaving me grief-stricken among strangers with four little children to care for, Emily the oldest only nine years old. I had relatives at Conneaut, Ohio, and concluded to go there; so I took my motherless children and went as far as Erie in wagons, then hired a small boat and went on to Conneaut. I went to housekeeping and got along very well through the winter. The following spring my brother Samuel was going to Michigan, so I made him the best arrangement in my power for my children to remain at Conneaut, and came to Newport on St. Clair river with my brother and his family, early in May, 1819.

In the autumn of 1822 I moved my household goods from Conneaut to Newport, bringing with me two of my motherless children, Emily, and Eber B., leaving my other two daughters with their friends in Ohio. We were three days making the trip from Conneaut to Detroit in the steamer Walk-in-the-water. We went from Detroit to Newport in an open boat, and I told the children they would probably live to see a line of steamers on the river.

My brother's fmaily invited us to move in with them. I accepted the invitation for a short time, and then moved into a little log cabin. I soon built an addition to it, which gave us two rooms to our house, and we were very comfortable. At that time there were at Newport, William Gallagher, James B. Wolverton, Bela Knapp, Samuel Ward, and myself and our families. Five families at Newport and on Belle River there were five or six French families, all enterprising people, and all owners of farms.<sup>1370</sup>

• My Uncle, Zael Ward, owned a farm adjoining my father's in Keene Valley, Essex Co., N. Y., and resided on it some twelve or fifteen years. On selling out he purchased and moved on to a farm in the town of Harmony, Chautauqua Co., N. Y., about the year 1828. The next year following my father's removal with his family to Newport, St. Clair Co., Mich. (now Marine City), in 1836, my Uncle Zael followed and settled also at Newport with his family of five girls and four boys, excepting his second daughter, Rhoda. The sons' names were Samuel, Eber, Zael and David. Samuel being about one year older and Eber one year younger than myself. After residing some fifteen to twenty years in Michigan, and a short time only after Uncle Samuel's death, Uncle Zael moved back to Chautauqua Co., N. • About this time [about 1831] Aunt Emily and her father came and lived in a little log house which stood near where Buttironi's store stands. Aunt Emily at this time taught school, and was

therefore the first school teacher that graced our village. Her life before and after this period was one of useful industry, and no family who has resided in this place for any considerable time but what has been the recipient of her kindness and a

witness of her unqualified goodness of heart.<sup>29</sup> • All the excuse my neighbors who supported this scheme gave was that after Cass Lake was drained largely of its waters, "Ward's place would be no more beautiful than theirs." And what intensified the meanness of the scheme was, I finally learned, that old Aunt Emily was behind the scenes urging on my envious neighbors who were running the lakelowering scheme. Aunt Emily had lately moved from Newport, now Marine City, and located near her august brother E. B. W. in Detroit, where she could the better watch and throw envious darts more forcibly through her brother's then great financial influence and power. Aunt Emily commenced slandering and persecuting me when a boy of fourteen years of age, in the year 1837. This lowering Cass Lake scheme was originated in 1867, and lasted in 1872. So you perceive that said Aunt Emily is still at it, after thirty-five years

of slandering me and meddling with my business interest to their injury whenever she saw an opportunity.3614

• And what became of old Aunt Emily? After the death of E. B. she quieted down, having lost her power and means to chase and persecute the chosen victims that her envious malice selected, and as a consequence, I have not felt her venom since E. B.'s death, which occurred over eighteen years ago. In August, 1891, eighteen months ago, Emily died, some eighty-three years of age. In person she was of oversize, uncommonly coarse and ugly looking in form, and face, with two sharp, intriguing, snakish, treacherous eyes. Her hair was reddish in color and coarse and stuck out in various directions on top and around her head. She was arrogant, egotistical and lively and overbearing in

conversation. In intrigue and spiteful, inhuman envy and malice, she seemed to be a monstrosity. She assumed great learning, wisdom and perfection. She was without taste or refinement. She controlled those under her influence and in her power, and made all such do her bidding as she desired, assited by the will, patronagte and power of her brother, E. B., the Czar. She was especially envious, venomous and vindictive against all fair or handsome marriageable women as if she imagined them to be in her way, as she was never married. She was full of personal vanity and given to causing her name and the good deeds which she ususally had not performed to be lengthily displayed in the newspapers of the day. She was largely devoid of human sympathy or benevolence, or the making of charitable gifts to any except to her personal toadies and tools, and to the children of her sisters, to whom she left her property, from thirty to fifty thousand dollars which had been given her mostly by her brother, E. B. Her assumptions and the prestige that E. B.'s wealth, power and patronage gave her, she made many imagine, ignorant of her real character, that she was not only wise, great and learned, but that whe was also about the perfection of wisdom and goodness. She being a human monstrosity in looks, form and size, physical strength and general appearance, caused many to imagine that she was some indescribable new kind of goddess. She was always, planning and scheming to the injury of Polly, E. B's first wife, encourage and championed E. B. in getting his divorce from her, while she stood at the right hand and acted as a hireling tool for Kate against Polly's children in her will contest. But the Lord in his mercy finally rid mankind of this unparalled anomaly.<sup>3614</sup>



• E. B. was about twenty-five or twenty-six years of age at the time of his marriage. His mother died early, and his father being poor, E. B. had come up roughly, largely among the French and Indians then inhabiting Michigan. He had been allowed his own way and being naturally egotistical, dishonest, brutal, avaricious, tyrannical, and of an immoral temperament, had but little respect for others' rights and feelings.<sup>3614</sup>

• When his uncle died in 1855, combining the inheritance with his own investments brought him to the status of Detroit's first millionaire.<sup>7019</sup>

• She [Clara Ward] was the daughter of the late Captain Eber Ward, the wealthiest man in Michigan, where he was known as "King of the Lakes."<sup>1372</sup>

• She [Clara Ward] was the daughter of Eber B. Ward, a millionaire shipbuilder of Detroit, Mich.<sup>1373</sup>

• EBER B. WARD was born in Canada in 1811, his parents having fled into that country from Vermont, to escape the ravages consequent upon "the war of eighteen hundred and twelve." But he was not destined to remain long in the enemy's country. As soon as the smoke had died away from the last battlefield, the family returned to their pleasant home in Rutland county, Vermont, where they remained until Mr. Ward was about six years old. At this period, the future of the American States being fixed, civilization again resumed its westward march. Vermont, among other New England states, contributed to the movement, and in 1817 many of the best families of the Green Mountain state were seeking a more lucrative inheritance in the boundless West and South. Mr. Ward's parents were among the travelers. They had set out for Kentucky, but being delayed at Waterford, Pennsylvania, for some time, owing to a disarrangement in their plans for transportation, a sad dispensation of Providence interrupted their journey. Mr. Ward's mother, after a severe illness, died, and was buried at this place. Changing there course, the father and son went into Ohio. Subsequently events led them westward until they were permanently located in

Michigan.

Mr. Ward first landed in Detroit in 1821, when he was only nine years old. Then he was a poor boy, without even the prospect of fortune and success; but, observe the course he pursued, and the results that attended his efforts. Nature seems to have qualified him to battle the perils of pioneer life; and, as if to increase the hardships that apparent ill fortune had already visited upon him, at the age of twelve years he secured the humble position of cabin boy on a small schooner on the lakes. Thus was modestly inaugurated Captain Ward's marine life. It is inexpedient to tax the reader with all the changing scenes that came over his life since this dedication of boyhood to the interests of navigation. It is enough to say that from these humble beginnings, by hard industry and timely enterprise, he has won success for lake navigation, and wealth for himself. His accumulations are said to exceed five millions, and may be summed up as follows: \$1,000,000 in Chicago Rolling Mills stock, \$500,000 in Milwaukee Rolling Mills stock, \$500,000 in Wyandotte Rolling Mills stock, \$500,000 in floating property, and over \$2,000,000 in real estate.

Mr. E.B. Ward is now about sixty-two years of age, but is prosecuting his enormous business with all the vigor and exactness of his youth.<sup>2355</sup>

#### • CAPTAIN EBER B. WARD

While his parents were on their way from Vermont to the west, through Canada, they were compelled to delay at New Hamborough, upper Canada, where Captain Eber Brock Ward was born December 25, 1811. His parents brought him to Michigan and with them he bore the privations, trials and hardships incident to pioneer life.

At twenty-two years of age we find him at work on the farm of his uncle Samuel Ward, of St. Clair county. In the winter of 1835-6 he assisted his uncle in getting out ship timber, and in the spring of 1836 purchased of his uncle a quarter interest in a small schooner. Thus commenced a partnership which continued during the life of his uncle. In 1840 the firm built its first steamer, and in 1845 it owned and controlled a fleet of twenty steamers and sail vessels. In the latter year he ran two steamers on Lakes Michigan and Erie in connection with the Michigan Central railroad. This service he continued until that road had reached Chicago and the Great Western road was completed and connected with it at Detroit. The Ward vessels afterward a large general transportation business on Lakes Erie, Huron, Michigan, and Superior. During a portion of this period Capt. Ward became interested in the mines of Lake Superior, and also in the pine lands lying along the shores of Lakes Michigan and Huron, and soon afterward projected and saw completed the Flint and Pere Marquette railroad across the northern portion of the State. In 1864 he reduced his vessel interests somewhat, devoting his means to mining and manufacturing and in the

course of a few years had rolling mills at Wyandotte, Chicago, and Milwaukee, and had established large manufacturing industries at Ludington, Toledo, Saginaw, and Flint.

Among the most remarkable characteristics of Capt. Ward was his wonderful business ability and his capacity for organizing industrial enterprises. Perhaps no single individual in the United States did so much to disseminate information on the subject of promoting home industries as Captain Ward.

As he has often repeated to the writer, he believed that the best philanthropy of the age was that which afforded the greatest amount of remunerative labor to the working men of the country. His heart was large, his charity abundant, his forethought and foresight wonderful his will power indomitable, and his physical and moral courage dauntless.<sup>2356</sup>

• There has been a remarkable success in business men who have begun operations here. E. B. Ward stands at the head of these, and is supposed by some to be worth \$10,000,000. When I first became acquainted with E. B. Ward, forty years ago, I suppose his entire earthly inheritance would be put at less than \$100. The inquiry has been made. Why the remarkable success of so heavy business men at Newport or Marine City? I think it originated mainly from old Capt. Samuel Ward.<sup>29</sup>

• This gave E. B. Ward, in addition, practically the franchises of the steamboat lake passenger and freight routes, as he largely monopolized these routes. These monopolized lake steamboat lake routes, fairly managed, were worth another million or two of dollars, as the passenger traffic to the West by lakes continued immense for some fifteen or twenty years afterwards.

After Uncle Samuel's death, his willed estate, in addition to a considerable property possessed before by Eber B. Ward, mostly given him by Uncle Samuel before his death, constituted Eber B. Ward comparatively a wealthy man at about 1855, considering the poverty of then new West. Thus, at about 44 years of age, it came to pass, though he was largely so before that age, that E. B. Ward became an overbearing, ego, vainglorious, dishonest, tyrannical, vindictive, aggressive, energetic, selfish man, largely devoid of conscience. This tyrannical, envious, vain, selfish, grasping, energetic man soon spread out his then comparatively vast fortune in some legitimate investments, but mostly in illegitimate dishonest schemes, in view of showing his financial ability, power and consequence. His schemes were largely the grasping of others' property, paying therefor little or no equivalent.

At the time of Uncle Samuel's sickness and death, E. B. Ward placed sentinels at the outer doors of Uncle Samuel's residence and would not permit any of Uncle Samuel's brothers, sisters, or any other of the relations, except his own sister, Emily Ward, to enter

the house, but himself and his lawyer who drew up the will he desired giving about all of Uncle Samuel's property to E. B. Ward, leaving out entirely the sisters, brothers and other relatives of Uncle Samuel, some of whom were poor invalids unable to obtain the necessaries of life. Ever after these poor distressed relatives, who had thus been virtually robbed by E. B. Ward's management of Uncle Samuel's will, were followed by E. B. Ward and persecuted while they lived. Other relatives whom E. B. Ward envied, or was jealous of, he persecuted in the same way by all the power and influence he possessed. For some twenty years after the death of Uncle Samuel, E. B. Ward continued in the career above mentioned, dishonoring himself, the name of Ward and human nature, defying the laws of common decency, and at time defying and riding over the laws of his country. He raised a family of six children, four sons and two daughters. The sons followed largely in the footsteps of their father before and after the father's death, so that all but one, and he is said to be now a renegade, soon disappeared from the face of the earth.

About 1862, among other crimes, E. B. W. got up a false accusation against his wife, who being a niece of "Aunt Betsey," it largely assisted him in "scooping" Uncle Samuel's property by his will, and who also raised his family of six children. By false swearing and bribery E. B. obtained a bill of divorce in order that he might marry a blooming young woman, a niece of Senator Wade's, Kate Lyon, as she was called, with whom he lived some nine years, until his death in 1874.

A career filled with wrong doing and crime, energetically executed, usually results in financial ruin. This proved especially so with E. B. W., considering his wealth, and the royal opportunities he had in a new undeveloped country, containing large natural resources. Had he used his large monopolizing means in legitimate investments and business devoid of immorality, dishonesty, tyranny and crime, with his good health, energy and great physical power, the financial result should have been immense.

However, the result was that E. B. Ward's administrators (though his will proclaimed to the world that he had millions) found after his death that his estate was virtually insolvent and not sufficient to pay his debts by some two hundred thousand dollars. Thus was squandered Uncle Samuel's large estate, of some two millions of dollars at his death, and in addition the product of E. B. W.'s opportunities, equivalent in comparative value of from fifteen to thirty millions of dollars at this date of 1893.<sup>3614</sup>

• Detroit's first millionaire E.B. Ward is credited with being the first to use the Bessemer steel process in Michigan as well as being a key influence in the city's industrial growth.

E.B. Ward was born on December 25, 1811 in New Hamborough Upper Canada during his parent's move from Vermont to Michigan. In 1833, he moved to Newport, MI to work

for his Uncle Samuel Ward who was a reputable businessman and shipbuilder. E.B. positioned himself to inherit his uncle's property by marrying a niece of his uncle's wife.

In 1840, E.B. was the captain of the Huron, the first steamship built by Samuel Ward's shipyard. During this time, the westward migration through the Great Lakes was taking place and Samuel and E.B. were able to benefit from this using the routes they had set up. In the years prior to the railroad in Michigan, they ran monopolized travel and freight through the Great Lakes. One of the first steel–hulled boats to navigate the Great Lakes was in fact E.B.'s boat.

E.B. began to invest in large tracts of pineland for the lumber in the early 1850s. He constructed a mill, docks, warehouse and supply store in Forestville, MI but, before the town was officially named, he sold all of his holdings there and moved to Detroit.

When his uncle died in 1855, combining the inheritance with his own investments brought him to the status of Detroit's first millionaire.

In 1855, E.B. built the Eureka Iron and Steel Co. along the Detroit River. It was here that he began to use the Bessemer Steel Process. While he controlled a portion of the patents essential to generate steel by this process, his competitors managed related patents. Due to this overlap, neither could assemble a state of the art steel facility without violating the others' claim. Thus a merger of patents took place and the Bessemer Steel Association was created.

By 1868, E.B. had expanded his interests to other states, including a rolling mill in Wisconsin and what would become one of the big four silver mines in Utah. He was brilliant when it came to diversifying his investment and business interests. During the 1860s, he divorced his wife and remarried a much younger woman. When he died his children from both marriages clashed over his vast wealth.

• Were Polly and Jane sisters?<sup>3226</sup>

• Polly McQueen, the eldest, was the one E. B. Ward soon after married with a view of uniting Aunt Betsey's feelings with Uncle Sam's in order to manage and scoop Uncle Sam's property by will or otherwise.<sup>3614</sup>

• In Jan. 1875, E. B. Ward dropped dead on Griswold Street in the City of Detroit, at about sixty-three years of age. Some eight years before he had obtained a bill of divorce from his wife (originally Polly McQueen) by fraud and bribery of the judge, as it was reported. Polly McQueen was an orphan child raised by Aunt Betsey, Uncle Sam's wife. When E. B. married her she was a fine looking, intelligent young lady. It was understood at the time that E. B.'s main object in marrying Polly was to secure Uncle Sam's great property, which he finally gained by his marriage, and his later various schemes.

Polly, soon after the divorce, pined away and died.<sup>3614</sup>

• Prior to the divorce E. B. had courted and was engaged to a dashing, good looking young lady about twenty-five or thirty years his junior, by the name of Catherine Lyon, a niece of Senator Benjamin F. Wade. E. B. had lived some six or eight years with his second wife, Catherine Lyon, at the time of his death. After E. B's death, the administrators of his estate soon found out that the assets converted into money would not pay the indebtedness of the estate, as it was owing a little less than two million dollars. The Ludington mills and pinery were willed outright to Kate, the second wife, which finally proved to be the main part of the valuable available portion of the estate.<sup>3614</sup>

• But what of Kate? After the will was settled, she married a broken down real estate man (a citizen of Canada) with a family of children, whom Kate supposed was another millionaire. 

flings from the McQueen girls, Aunt Betsey's nieces, Betsey and Kate, respectively sixteen and eighteen years of age who were now learning to read. Kate succeeded in a way, but Betsey never did. This was their first and last school attendance. Neither Uncle Sam nor Aunt Betsey could read or write, they claiming that they had gotten along better than those who were "eddecated," and consequently "eddecations" was a damage which "Uncle Nate" and his family were afflicted with.<sup>3614</sup>

• The book I found and read was "The Autobiography of David Ward," published privately in 1912 for his children; about 200 pages long. David Ward was the son of Nathan Ward and nephew of Samuel Ward and his wife Aunt Betsey. Much of this book consists of a diatribe against Samuel and Eber B. Ward, claiming a conspiracy by Eber B. to rewrite Samuel's will and get the whole huge inheritance himself. But even before that evil

moment, Samuel has been a terrible lying cheat of a relative, grasping and vindictive, and his lackies in Marine City join him in making life miserable for poor David and his parents and siblings. No Gallagher is ever mentioned, but they would have been among the lackies. The "Aunt Emily" of some fame is a monstrous bitch in this book, keeping up her evil ways on David his whole life through. If you haven't read the book, you really should. It also has many many pages on the pine/lumber industry, where David Ward makes his fortune finally, by the shrewd buying and selling of acreage around the state in the 1850s and later.<sup>3596</sup>



• Clara Ward, formerly the Princess Chimay, and later the wife of Peppino Ricciardo, was born in 1873 in Detroit, Mich. She was the daughter of the late Captain Eben [sic] Ward, the wealthiest man in Michigan, where he was known as "King of the Lakes."

He left her more than \$3,000,000.

Miss Ward was educated in London. She met Prince Joseph of Chimay and Caraman in Nice, to whom she was married by the Papal Nuncio in Paris, in 1890.

Four years later, Princess Chimay met Rigo, the Gypsy violinist, who was then playing in a Paris café. She became infatuated with him and shortly afterward they eloped and for several years they were frequently heard of in various European capitals. They were together for about three years, and the last heard of the affair was in 1913, when she sued Rigo for \$100,000, which she alleged she had loaned to him.

In June, 1904, Princess Chimay married Peppino Ricciardo, a canvasser for a tourist agency in Paris, but was unhappy in this union, as it was reported during 1910 that they had parted.<sup>1372</sup>

• BERLIN, March 21 [1897] - It is announced that the [unclear] Princess Chimay, formerly Clara Ward of Detroit, who eloped from Paris some time ago with a Hungarian fiddler called Janos Rigo, and who was afterward divorced by her husband, the Prince of Chimay of Belgium, will appear on the stage at the Wintergarten in this city on April 4, accompanied by Rigo.<sup>3612</sup>

• In 1897, Todd's grandmother made the "Grand Tour" throughout Europe and the Near East, accompanied by her mother, Charlotte Louise (Cheney) Holden. The younger Charlotte, "Lottie," was "secretly" engaged to David Williams McMorran at the time (her parents knew, and approved). While in Egypt they "saw" Clara Ward - a notorious woman in those days - and mentioned having seen "postcards" of her, dressed in "oriental" garb and very little of it at that. I wonder what their reaction was, <u>if</u> they ever discovered that Clara was a half-sister to some of David's cousins?<sup>1394</sup>

• BUDA-PESTH, Dec. 21 [1899] - Newspapers here state that the Princess of Chimay and Caraman, formerly Miss Clara Ward of Detroit, Mich., the report of whose elopement with a Hungarian Tzigane (a Gypsy musician) caused such a sensation in aristocratic circles a short time ago, has arrived at Stuhl, Weissenburg, in company with the Tzigane, whose name is Rigo. They deny that they eloped.

The Princess declares that she openly bade farewell to her husband before she left his home, and that he was fully aware of her love for Rigo and her intention to go with him. The Princess, the papers add, has visited Rigo's parents, who live in a Gypsy hut, and promised them that she would marry their son as soon as she was divorced.<sup>3613</sup>

• A few years ago, E. B. Ward's daughter by his second wife, Kate Lyon, as she was usually called, married an impecunious prince in Europe for the title of princess. She lately left her

husband and two young children, eloped with a Gypsy musician and is now living with unmarried...<sup>3614</sup>

• The petition recites that the estate is worth approximately \$1,124,935.90 in personal property and \$50,000 in real estate, practically all of which is left to Giuseppe Riccardi, who is in Italy; Maria De Chimay, a daughter, and Joseph De Chimay, a son, who resides in Paris.<sup>1373</sup>


