MRS. ANDERSON OF SORRENTO IS MOURNED

SORRENTO. — Our dear friend and neighbor Mrs. Sadie Anderson is dead, and now lies in her last resting place under the cedars and firs in our little churchyard of St. Mary's. Affectionately known to a large circle of friends, "Mrs. Andy" is sincerely lamented and will be sorely missed by all of us to whom she had endeared herself by her many kindnesses and hospitalities. She leaves to mourn her loss a sorrowing husband, her dear little daughter, Jean, and her mother, sisters and brother who reside in Winnipeg.

The funeral took place at St. Mary's church, Sorrento, at 2:30 Wednesday afternoon, Rev. F. W. Wheeler, our vicar, and Rev. M. E. West of Salmon Arm, our late vicar, officiating. During the service the two hymns "Abide With Me" and "Unto the Hills Around" were sung.

As the cortege passed to the graveside "O Rest In the Lord" was played by H. H. Vernon who presided at the organ in the absence of Mrs. F. Bayless who is recovering from an illness. Signs of the respect in which "Mrs. Andy" was held were shown by the number ~~who attended the funeral, from the~~ district and also from Kamloops, Salmon Arm, Chase and so far away as Vancouver. Her friends Mr. and Mrs. Mackenzie motored up specially to be present at the graveside.

And the flowers, from the beautiful wreaths and crosses of lilies and carnations, etc., to the no less lovely offerings of wild flowers gathered by the school children they smothered and surrounded the grave, a sight to make the heart rejoice knowing that the dear one beneath them would also rejoice, for she loved flowers and walked in her own garden only a few days ago to see how they were coming on for we get them late up in these hills.

One noticed in the churchyard also come to pay their last respects, Indians from the reserve and Squilax; these would have cause to remember her kind heart for they would not be sent from her home without refreshment after a long walk with their baskets or flowers. "Mrs. Andy's" sister, Miss Winifred Forbes, was able to reach Sorrento from Winnipeg in time to be present at the last rites.

"Mrs. Andy" was only 38 years old and after her return from the Royal Inland Hospital whence she left in such apparent good health and spirits it is hard to realize that so devoted a wife and loving mother and sincere friend is taken from us. Her bright, kindly and cheerful personality will be sadly missed.

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
